Rebecca "Beckie" Boulton


Rockingham County Division of Public Health

Local Health Department Recognition

Immunization Team

Brunswick County Health Services

Brunswick County Health Services' Immunization Team has made great strides in reaching some of its youngest patients, helping to protect children not only by vaccinating them but by vaccinating the adults who come in contact with them. The team provides kindergarten physicals at each school to help prevent students from being suspended for not being immunized.

Adverse Childhood Experience (ACE) Collaborative

Buncombe County

Health and Human Services

This collaborative pulls together a diverse array of community stakeholders, including educational, medical, mental health, early childhood development and non-profit leadership, to address and prevent adverse childhood experiences that are considered to be traumatizing for children and their families.

★ **Shield of Protection Immunization Program** **Buncombe County**

Health and Human Services

Hundreds of Buncombe County students are now "immunization heroes" and have their names on the Superhero Wall of Fame to prove it. Buncombe County Health and Human Services has developed an innovative campaign called The Shield of Protection campaign to tackle failing immunization rates.

Dental Practice

Catawba County Public Health

Providing dental care to pregnant women is just as important as providing it to children after they are born. Catawba County Public Health Dental Practice partnered with several agencies to provide increased access to dental care for children up to 5 years old and to pregnant women covered by Medicaid.

★ **Mobile Dental Clinic** **Cabarrus Health Alliance**

Like many other counties, Cabarrus takes dental services to students with a mobile dental clinic, saving time for parents and making it easier on students who can see a dentist at school. But the Cabarrus Health Alliance portable mobile dental unit is unique in that it serves as a Dental Home to students by visiting each school twice per year.

School Health Staff **Cleveland County Health Department**

Cleveland County Health Department contracts with the school system to provide health services to students, using a staff of registered nurses, including five who are nationally certified in school nursing, and four family nurse practitioners. These staff members are very committed to improving the health of students, and loyal to and supportive of their schools.

Child Health Clinic **Cumberland County Department of Public Health**

In Cumberland County, public health staff promote literacy with the Reach Out and Read program, which provides free books to its target group of low-income children 6 months through 5 years



old. The clinic also has begun an expansive program to educate parents about safe sleeping practices to reduce the incidence of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.

Children's Environmental Health Section **Guilford County Department of Health & Human Services**

The Guilford County Public Health Children's Environmental Health Section promotes and protects children by ensuring a safe and healthy environment through lead poisoning prevention, minimizing asthma triggers and enforcing childcare regulations. Guilford's staff also inspects childcare centers for safe food handling, proper sanitizing and disinfecting, general cleanliness and overall facility safety.

Early Is Best Home Visiting Program Guilford County Department of Health & Human Services

When parents bring new babies into homes that are not stable, whether for financial, emotional or other reasons, the infants are at risk for developmental and maltreatment issues. In Guilford County, the public health staff has established the Early Is Best Nurse Home Visiting Program to expand and complement the Universal Newborn Home Visiting Program, offering information or referrals for a number of issues, including breastfeeding, depression screening, child care and effective parenting skills.

Immunization Coalition Henderson County Department of Public Health

As a result of a recent pertussis outbreak in western North Carolina, Henderson County public health immunization nurses reached out to pediatric providers to form the Henderson County Immunization Coalition. Using educational materials, including PSAs shown at the local movie theater, the group promoted early childhood and adolescent immunizations.

School Health Vision Screening Program Henderson County Department of Public Health

Vision disorders and undetected vision problems in children can lead to learning difficulties, delayed development or vision loss. Henderson County has developed an innovative approach to its public school vision screenings by partnering with the Etowah Lions Club to use its technology to provide faster screening.



Child Dental Clinic Macon County Public Health Department

Since 2004, Macon County Public Health has been providing dental services to children using the "Molar Roller," a 53-foot mobile dental clinic semi-trailer equipped with dental hygiene equipment and services. Since it began, the Molar Roller has provided 29,899 dental visits and performed 99,783 dental procedures.

★ Child Health Program Northampton County Health Department

In Northampton County, RECESS does not mean students take a break. Instead, RECESS puts them on the move. To combat high rates of overweight/obesity, Child Health Program staff use the USDA "My Plate" and "Eat Smart, Move More" program materials, take-home exercise equipment and a monthly after-school nutrition and exercise program in partnership with several other agencies.

Dental Division Orange County Health Department

When moms learn to take better care of their own oral health, their young children will, too. For this reason, the Orange County Health Department Dental Clinic has begun an outreach program targeting pregnant women and young



children, educating parents on the importance of good oral hygiene with the Prenatal Oral Health Program and the Baby Oral Health Program.

Healthy Homes Program Richmond County Health Department

Through the Healthy Homes Program, Richmond County staff addresses multiple childhood diseases and injuries in the home, focusing on housing-related hazards in a coordinated fashion rather than addressing a single hazard at a time. The Healthy Homes initiative builds upon other health department programs that address a variety of environmental health and safety concerns, including mold, lead, allergens, asthma, carbon monoxide, home safety, pesticides and radon.

Mitchell-Yancey Substance Abuse Task Force

Toe River Health District

Like so many areas of the country, Mitchell and Yancey counties faced serious substance abuse issues in their communities. A community-led, grassroots, volunteer coalition formed called the Mitchell Yancey Substance Abuse Task Force (MYSATF) formed to tackle the complex nature of substance abuse and prevention by providing education, outreach and programs like pill collections.

Child Health Well Child Checks Wilkes County Health Department

Landra Roope is efficient and effective in coordinating services and referrals for children and making sure parents know about appointment dates and times, but she often steps into her job as Expanded Role Nurse, as well. She sees children for Well Child Checks four days a week, and if the clinic is short-staffed, she'll add extra appointments to her plate.

MESH Mental Health Program Wilkes County Health Department

The Mobile Expanded School Health Program (MESH) from the Wilkes County Health Department provides mental health counseling for uninsured and underinsured high school students by a therapist qualified in treating adolescents. The therapist works with students who have suicidal thoughts, harmful behaviors and anger management outbursts and assists them with improving life skills.
